Blog (%15): You will write the blog (Blogspot/Blogger) individually. You are expected to share the reflections of the lesson flow/process, what you learned during the week what you learned and your experiences on a weekly basis. You can also share your notes, screenshots of your progress, and other related materials on your blog. Rubrics will be given.

Classwork (%15): There will be 3 (3x5 pts) tasks during the semester. These assignments may be related to discussion of the basic concepts in development and learning, comparation of the different theories of development, and discussion of the main approach to learning.

Poster Presentation/Infographic (10%+10%): The infographic will be developed two times during the semester. In groups, you are going to prepare an infographic on a topic of your choice related to one of the theories covered in the class. The rubric and more information on infographic tasks will be shared.

Midterm Exam (20%): There will be a mid-term exam that will include multiple choice and short answer questions covering both the lectures and notes.

Final Exam (30%): There will be a final exam that will include multiple choice and short answer questions covering both the lectures, notes. The final exam date will be announced by the university.

a. Plagiarism is a form of dishonesty that occurs when a person passes off someone else's work as his or her own. This can range from failing to cite an author for ideas incorporated into a student's paper to cutting and pasting paragraphs from different websites to handing in a paper downloaded from the internet. All are plagiarism.

b. All parties to plagiarism are considered equally guilty. If you share your coursework with another student and s/he plagiarizes it, you are considered as guilty as the one who has plagiarized your work since you enabled the plagiarism to take place. <u>Under no circumstances should a student make his/her coursework available to another student unless the instructor gives explicit permission for this to happen.</u> Copying someone's work is an extreme and straightforward act of plagiarism. More commonly, however, students plagiarize without realizing they are doing so. This generally happens when a student fails to acknowledge the source of an idea or phrasing. Avoid plagiarism by citing sources properly! For all rules and requirements of APA citations, please consult the 6th edition of the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association.
